Let There be Light.



This is tree sap, The Mangyans use it for light in the evenings by collecting it and burning it in a small bowl. Needless to say it does not produce much light. We teach Mangyans to read and provide them with Bibles in their language. But gathering in the evening after their day of work to have a Bible study is difficult to say the least. But God provided a solution! I came across a solar powered light system that is sold in Manila. We ordered 10 sets and had them shipped to Naujan and San Jose on Mindoro island where the Timothy mission workers that go in to the mountains and boondocks to serve the Mangyans live. There are some happy brothers and sisters there now! Thanks for helping us be able to do these things to strengthen the churches on Mindoro.

First New Church of 2024

2023 saw six churches built in the mountains for the various Mangyan tribes God has used Timothy Mission to reach. Admittedly they are well built pavilions with sides. But they are great to a Mangyan. There is no winter, so insulation and furnaces are not needed. There are openings in the walls where windows could go but the Mangyan do not want windows in them so that the air can flow through the church. So, it only costs about \$1000 US to build a church. Currently that is equal to P 56,000 Filipino Pesos. It can take from nine to eighteen hours to haul the construction materials up to the sites. And this is done on foot. Following are photos of the newest church under construction and photos related to the solar light paragraph above.



Not only do the Tagalogs from the developed coastal areas carry construction materials up to the tribe, but they bring along food for the workers and tribe. Click on the link to view a short video of the food preparation.
